PART I

SOME GENERAL QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

1: What is the Peace Corps and who are the Volunteers

The Peace Corps is an organization of American men and women who have volunteered their services in assisting developing nations to overcome some of their more urgent problems. It was established in 1961 at the request of the late President of the United States, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, by an Act of the American Congress. The Director of the Peace Corps organization is Mr. R. Sargent Shriver whose offices are located in Washington, D.C.

The Peace Corps Volunteers range in age from 18 to 74; they come from all parts of the United States of America and all fifty States of the United States are represented in the Peace Corps. There are no membership restrictions against races, religions, sexes, nationalities or creeds. The Volunteers represent all social classes of all income groups in America.

MAFUNSO ENA NDI MAYANKHO

1. Mapisi Koropusi ndi chiani nanga odzipereka ndi ndani?

Mapisi Koropusi ndi gula la ma Amereka achimuna ndi achikazi amene adzipereka kuthandiza mitundu ya anthu imene ikukula kugonjetsa zobvuta zao za msanga. Linayambidwa mu chaka ca 1961 ndi mpempho la malemu. Mtsogoleri wa mkuru wa maiko ogwirizana aku Amereka John Fitzgerald Kennedy, ndi Lamulo la Kongeresi ya Amereka. Mtsogozo wa gulu

la Mapisi Koropusi ndi Bambo R. Sargent Shriver amene maogesi ao ali mu Washington, D.C.

Mapisi Koropusi odzipelekawa misinkhu yao iyambira pa zaka makumi asanu ndi ziwiri ndi mphambu zinai (74), achokera ku mbali zonse za maiko ogwirizana aku Amereka, maiko makumi asanu onse ogwirizana ali kuimiridwa mu Upisi Koropusi.

Palibe kuletsedwa kukhala membara chifukwa cha mitundu, zipembezo, zikhulupiro kapena umuna kapena ukazi. Odziperekawa aimira magulu onse azitukuko ndi magulu onse obwera mu Amereka.

2. What are the overall objectives of the Peace Corps?

There are three objectives or purposes of the Peace Corps, which are:

- a) To assist developing nations to meet some of their needs for trained middle level manpower by furnishing Volunteers who possess such needed skills.
- b) To help the people of the countries in which Volunteers are serving to develop a better understanding of the American people.

- c) To help Americans to develop a better understanding of the people of the countries in which Volunteers are serving through their contact with Peace Corps Volunteers, their families and friends.

Underlying these three purposes is the belief that the Peace Corps can be an instrument for the promotion of world peace and understanding.

2. Zochita zeni-zeni za mapisi Koropusi Nzotani?

Pali zifukwa zeni-zeni zitatu za Upisi Koropusi dizo izi:

- a) Kuthandi za kukweza mitundu imene ikukwera mu zofuna zao za maphunziro oyenesa powapatsa odzipeleka amene ali ndi maluntha ofunikawo.
- b) Kuthandiza anthu a maiko m'mene odziperekawa akuthandiza kukweza dziko ndi kudzindikira za ubwino wa anthu aku Amereka.
- c) Kuthandiza Ma Amereka ku kweza kudzindikira kwabwino anthu a maiko m'mene odziperekawa akuthandiza kupyolera mwa olchala nao Mapisi Koropusi odzipeleka; mabanja ao, ndi mabwenziao.

Mwa zifukwa zitatu ndi chidule chakuti Ma Peace Corps angakhale chida chokweza mtendere ndi kumvana m'dziko lapansi.

3. How does one become a Peace Corps Volunteer?

The Peace Corps is strictly a voluntary organization. Any American citizen who has the skills needed, who is of good moral character, who is in good physical health and who can make a suitable adjustment overseas is free to join. If a person is interested in the Peace Corps, he or she submits an application to the Office of Selection in Washington D.C. If he qualifies for the Peace Corps, he is invited into a training program. If he accepts the invitation and survives the training program, he comes overseas as a Peace Corps Volunteer.

3. Munthu angakhale ma Peace Corps wodsipereka Bwanji?

Peace Corps ndi gulu lodzipeleka basi. Mbadwa iriyonse ya Amereka imene ili ndi maluntha ofunika, amene ali ndi mkhailidwe wabwino, amene ali ndi moyo wa thanzi ndi amene angathe kudzisandutsa mbyenera m'maiko a pa tsidya la nyanja ali ndi ufulu wolowa. Ngati munthu akondweretsedwa mu Mapisi Koropusi, mwamuna kapena mkazi amalemba kalata yofunsa ku ofesi yosankha mu Washington, D.C. Ngati ali woyenera kukhala Mapisi Koropusi, amai-

tanidwa ku sukulu ya dongosolo lace. Ngati alola kuitanidwako ndi kupambana sukulu ya dongosoloyo amabwera ku tsidya la nyanja monga Mapisi Koropusi wodzipereka.

4. What is involved in the training program in the U.S?

The training program is usually held at an American University for a period of eight to twelve weeks, depending upon the nature of the program. It usually consists of 300 hours of training in the major language of the host country (in this case, in Chinyanja), training in the history, social customs and cultural development of the host country (Malawi), additional training in the work they will be doing overseas (i.e. teaching, public health, agricultural extension work, etc.), physical education and health orientation,

and the policies and objectives of the Peace Corps. In addition, most Volunteers undergo a brief orientation to the host country after they arrive overseas.

4. Chimakhudzidwa mu maphunsiro a dongosolo mu U.S. ndi chiani?

Mphunziro a dongosololi nthawi zonse amachitidwa pa sukulu ya pamwamba ya Amerika mwa milungu insanu ndi itatu kapena milungu khumi ndi iwiri, molingana ndi mtundu wa dongosolo limenelo. Nthawi zonse amakhala maphunsiro otenga maora mazana atatu m'zinenero zazikuru za dziko limenelo (mwa chitanzo, Chinyanja), maphunziro ambiri ya dziko, chitukuko cha miyambo ndi kukweza makhalidwe a dzikolo (Malawi), maphunziro oonjezera mu nchito imene adzaigwira patsidya pa nyanja (monga uphun-

zitsi, ya umoyo wa anthu, yokulitsa nchito ya mali-midwe, etc.), yolimbitsa thupi ndi za umoyo wa dzikolo, ndi zolinga ndi zifukwa zace za Mapisi Koropusi Poonjeserapo ambiri anthu odziperekawa amaphunzitsidwa mwachidule za makhalidwe a anthu a dzikolo atafikako.

5. How long do the Colunteers usually stay overseas?

The normal tour of service with the Peace Corps is for two years. However, Volunteers may extend for an additional year in the same country or sign up for a second two-year period of service either in the same country or in a different country.

5. Odziperekawa maakhala nthawi yaitali motain pa tsidya pa nyanja?

Nthawi yoyenera nchito ya Mapisi Koropusi ndi zaka ziwiri. Komabe odziperekawa angathe kuonjezera chaka china mudziko lomwe olilo kapena kulemberanso nthawi yina ya nchito ya zaka ziwiri ngakhale mudziko lomwelo kapena dziko lina.

6. Are the Volunteers paid a salary?

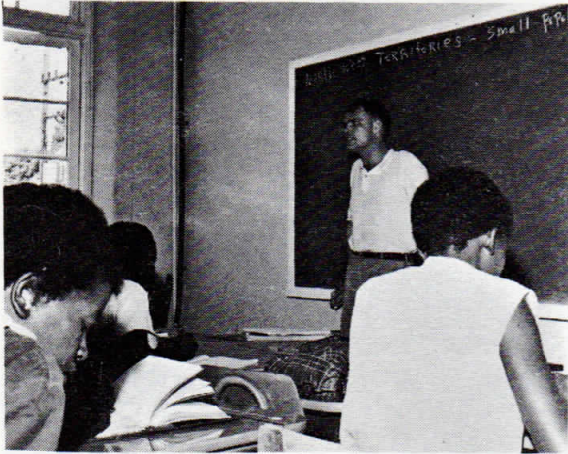
The Peace Corps Volunteers are not paid a salary in the true sense of the term. Instead, they are paid a modest monthly living allowance that takes care of the cost of food, clothing and other essentials. In addition, each Volunteer receives approximately £27 for each month of satisfactory service overseas when he returns to the United States to assist him in meeting the expenses of his new life in America.

6. Kodi odziperekawa amalipidwa ndarama?

Mapisi Koropusi odzipereka salipidwa muganizo lenileni la nthawi yao. Mmalo mwache a malipidwa kaphoso pang'ono pa mwezi kamene kamawathandiza kupezera chakudya, zobvala ndi zinthu zina. Poonjezerapo, aliyense amalandira pafupifupi £27 pa mwezi chifukwa cha nchito yabwino alo pa tsidya panyanja, kuti pamene abwerera ku Amereka zikamuthandize m'moyo wache wa tsopano mu Amereka.

7. What does the Government of Malawi pay the Volunteers?

The Volunteers have volunteered their services to the Government of Malawi and are not paid a salary by the Government. However, the Government makes its contribution to this scheme by furnishing housing to the Volunteers, exempting their subsistence allowance from local taxes, by providing hospital care to the Volunteers and taking care of their expenses when they are required to be away from their normal residence in the performance of their jobs.

7. Boma la Malawi limawalipira odziperekawa chiani?

Odziperekawa agwirila nchito Boma la Malawi ndipo salipidwa kanthu ndi Boma. Choncho, Boma lingothandiza chikonzedwa chimenechi popeleka nyumba zogna anthuwa, posawalola kukhoma nsonkho, powapatsa mankhwala awulere akadwala ndi kuwasamalira pamene afunika kuchoka pa malo pamene anafikiri kupita kwina kukagwira mchito yao.

8. What do the Volunteers do when they leave the Peace Corps?

Of the 3,000 Volunteers who have completed their

tour of service, about 55 per cent of them have decided to continue their University education. Most of these are taking a second or third degree. About 38 per cent of the Volunteers have found jobs with the American Government, in business organisations or as teachers. The remaining 7 per cent are enjoying their lives as housewives or fulfilling their military obligations or are retired.

8. Kodi odziperekawa pamene asiya upisi Koropusi Amachita chiani?

Mwa odzipereka zikwe zitatuwa amene atsiliza nchito yao, opitirira theka pang'ono apitiriza maphunziro ao apa mwamba. Ambiri aiwowa achita maphunziro achiririra kapena achiratu apamwamba. Okwanira pafupifupi makumi atatu ndi asanu ndi atatu apeza nchito m'mabizimesi kapena uphunzitsi mu Amereka. Ena otsala akwatiwa kapena alowa usilikari wankhondo kapena kulandira peshoni.

9. Do all of them hold University Degrees?

All of the Peace Corps teachers in Malawi hold one or more University degrees. About 99 per cent of the Volunteers in the remaining projects hold University degrees and the remaining one per cent hold diplomas in technical fields of study.

9. Kodi onse ali ndi maphunziro apa mwamba?

Mapisi Koropusi onse amene aphunzitsa m'Malawi ali ndi digiri imodzi kapena ambiri a sukulu ya pamwamba. Ndi ena pafupifupi makumi asanu ndi anai amene ali mu nchito zina ali ndi madigiri a sukulu ya pamwamba ndi ena atsala mu nchito zomangomanga ali ndi madipoloma.

PART II

MALAWI PEACE CORPS PROGRAMS

1. When did the Peace Corps come to Malawi?

The Peace Corps came to Malawi at the request of the Government of Malawi in late 1962 and the Volunteers began their work in January, 1963.

1. Dongosolo la mapisi koropusi m'Malawi? Kodi mapisi Koropusi anabwera liti m'Malawi?

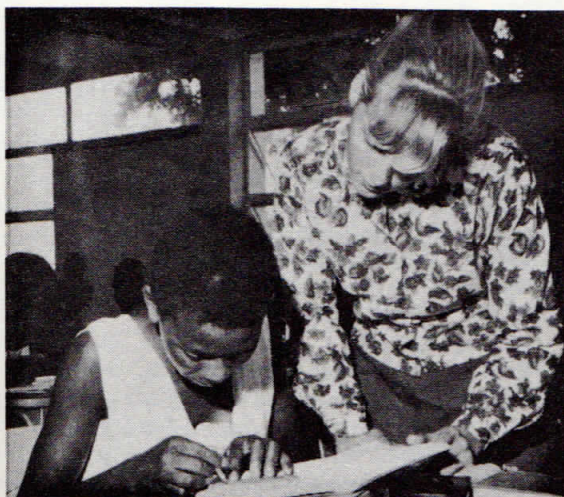
Mapisi Koropusi anamwera ku Malawi pa kutha pa chaka cha 1962. Ndipo anayamba nchito zao pa kuyamba pa chaka cha 1963.

2. How many Peace Corps Volunteers are there in Malawi?

As of May 1, 1965, there were 230 Volunteers working in various jobs in Malawi. By September, 1965, this number will increase to approximately 275 and by the end of 1965, we expect to have about 300 Peace Corps Volunteers in Malawi.

2. Kodi mu Malawi muli mapisi Koropusi angati?

Pa May 1, 1965, panali odzipeleka 230 kugwira nchito zosiyanasiyana mu Malawi. Pa September, 1965, chiwerengero ichi chidzafikira pafupi-fupi 275 ndipo pakutha pa chaka cha 1965, tiyembekezera kukhala nao pafupi 300 Mapisi Koropusi mu Malawi.

3. How does this number compare with the number in other countries?

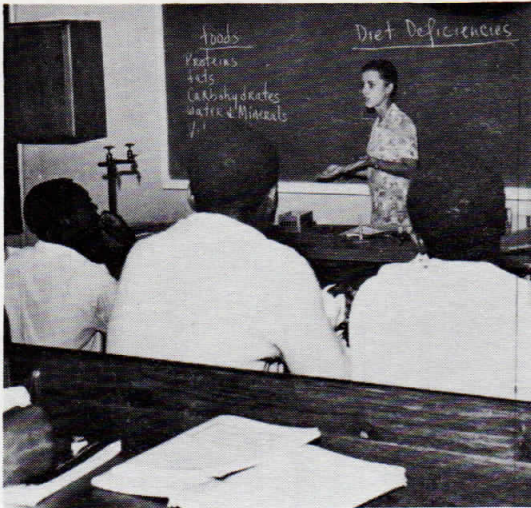
The Peace Corps is operating in 46 countries throughout the world. Seventeen of these countries are in Africa. The program in Malawi is the fifth largest program in all of Africa and the fourteenth largest Peace program in the world.

3. Chiwerengero ichi chikuyerekezedwa ndi cha m'maiko ena bwanji?

Upisi Koropusi ukuchitika m'maiko 46 m'dziko lonse la pansi. Maiki khumi ndi asanu ndi awiri a maiko amenewa ali mu Afirika muno. Dongosololi mu Malawi liri la chisanu lokulitsitsa mwa onse ali mu Afirika ndipo ndi la khumi ndi chinai lokulitsitsa m'dziko la pansi.

4. What kind of jobs are the Volunteers working on in Malawi?

The Peace Corps Volunteers in Malawi are working under the auspices of the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Justice, the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Trade and Industry, the Geological Survey and the Bureau of Statistics. The Volunteers are involved in Malawi education, public health, cooperative, legal training and statistical compilations.

4. Ndi nchito zotain odzipelekawa ali kugwira m'Malawi?

Mapisi koropusi odzipelekawa m'Malawi muno alikugwira nchito mu Unduna wa maphunziro, Unduna wa Malamulo. Unduna wa Umoyo, Unduna wa Nchito ndi Malonda, yofufuza'za miyata ndi bungwe la mawerengo. Odzipelekawa ali kukhuzidwa mu maphunziro a Malawi, mu Umoyo was anthu, zogwirizana, Maphunziro a Malamulo ndi mu zobvuta za mawerengo.

EDUCATION:

The first type of Peace Corps Program to come to Malawi was in the field of education. The Volunteers in this group comprise our oldest and largest Peace Corps effort in Malawi. Although Peace Corps Volunteers are performing more than 300 different types of jobs throughout the world, their major efforts have been in the field of education. More than one-half of the 10,000 Peace Corps Volunteers now overseas are teaching at either the primary, secondary or university levels. The same is true for Malawi.

The major emphasis in Malawi education during the past three years has been in the field of secondary

education. During the past three years, the Government of Malawi embarked on a great expansion program but the local resources were not able to meet all of the needs for teachers. The Peace Corps has been a source of assistance in this effort.

As of May 1, 1965 there were 169 Peace Corps Volunteers in service with the Ministry of Education. Of these, 124 are in 31 of Malawi's 36 secondary schools; 47 are teaching in 9 of Malawi's 12 Teacher Training Colleges; one is assigned to the Inspectorate; one is assigned to the Museum of Malawi and the remainder are teaching at the College of Commerce and Correspondence College.

The Volunteers are teaching the entire range of subjects taught in the secondary schools and Teacher Training Colleges and they are teaching in all of the forms from Form I through Form V. In addition to their regular teaching schedule, many are engaged in other school activities such as sports programs, choral groups, debating teams, drama groups, photography clubs and science clubs. Such activities are designed to assist the Volunteers in becoming well integrated into the school community and in playing an active role in the development of education in Malawi. Their immediate supervisor is the Headmaster of the school to which they are assigned.

MAPHUNZIRO

Dongosolo la mtundu wa Mapisi Koropusi oyamba kubwera kuno anali ambali ya maphunziro. Mbali ya gulu la maphunziro ndilo loyambirira ndi lokulitsitsa la zochita-chita za Mapisi Moropusi odzipeleka m'Malawi. Ngakhale akugwira nchito zosiyana-siyana zoposa mazana atatu m'dziko lapansi, nchito zao zazikuru ziri ku mbali ya maphunziro. Mapisi Koropusi odzipeleka oposa theka limodzi la zikwe khumi amene tsopano ali patsidya panyanja ali kuphunzitsa ngakhale mu masukulu a puralmare, sekondare ndiponso m'masukulu apamwamba. Mu Malawi zikuteronso.

Chofunika kwakukuru mu maphunziro a Malawi mu zaka zitatu zapitazp chinale maphunziro a sekondare. Mu zaka zitatu zimenezi, Boma la Malawi linali kuonjezera masekondare koma momuno mokha sikuhatheka kukwaniritsa aphunzitsi ofunikawo. Upisi Koropusi wakhala njira yothandiza mu nchito iyi.

Monga pa May 1, 1965, Mapisi Koropusi odzipelekawa anali 169 panchito mu unduna wa maphunziro. Mwa iwowa, 124 ali mu masekondare sukulu 31 a Malawi, 47 ali kuphunzitsa mu Makoleji 9 a Makoleji 12 a Malawi. Ophunzitsa za uphunzitsi, imodzi ali kwa zoyang'anira ma Sukulu, imodzi ali ku nyumba yosungira za chikale za Malawi ndi ena otsalira ali kuphunzitsa pa Koleji ya Komesi ndi pa Koleji ya Kolosipondasi.

Odzipelekawa ali kuphunzitsa maphunziro omwe aphunzitsidwa mu ma Sekondare Sukulu ndi Makoleji a uphunzitsi ndipo ali kuphunzitsa mu maforomu onse kuyambira foromu imodzi mpaka foromu isanu. Poonjezera pa chikonzedwa cha kuphunzitsa kwao kwa nthawi ndi nthawi, ambiri aiwo amalowerera mu zochita chita zina za pa Sukulu zonga masewera, maguly oyimba, magulu okambirana, magulu oyelekezera nthano, magulu otenga zinthunzi ndi magulu a Sayansi. Zochita chita zakonedwa kuthandiza Odzipelekawa kulowelera m'moyo was Sukuluyo ndi kutenga nao mbali mwa kuthandiza kukweza maphunziro mu Malawi. Wowayang'anira wao ndi mkuru wa Sukulu imene aikidwapoyo.

LAWYERS:

Two Volunteers are working in the legal field in Malawi. During the year-and-a-half that they have been in Malawi, these Volunteers have worked for the High Court; served as Law Reporters and updated statutes. They have also edited and corrected errors in reporting and trained a number of Magistrates. They have taught a variety of courses in law at the Mpemba Institute of Public Administration and have

tutored Law Court Presidents and Clerks. One is presently serving as a Local Court Commissioner.

MALOYALA:

Odzipeleka awiri alikugwira nchito ku mbali ya Malamulo m'Malawi. Mu chaka chimodzi ndi theka chimene akhala m'Malawi. Odzipelekawa akhala akugwira nchito mu Khoti ya Pamwamba kuthandiza ngati antola nkhanja Malamulo ndi kukonza Malamulo. Alembanso ndi kukonza zolakwa mwa kenuna ndi kuphunzitsa ma Majisitireti. PUBLIC HEALTH:

The Peace Corps Public Health project in Malawi is an integral part of the Ministry of Health. There are forty Volunteers participating in this program of tuberculosis diagnosis, treatment and prevention. These Volunteers are assigned in twos and threes at

each of the District Hospitals in 17 regions of the country. Each Volunteer is responsible for about 1000 people. These people are examined for tuberculosis and those who are found to have the disease are treated for the disease in their homes. The Volunteers also collect important data about family patterns attitudes and customs that will assist them in the treatment program.

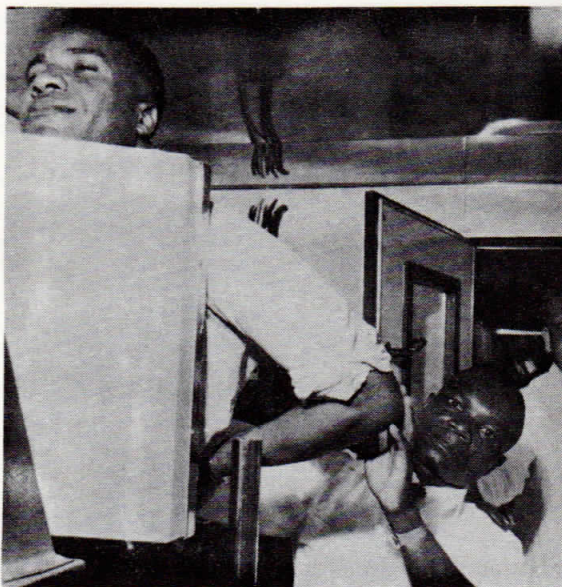
The Volunteers are also trained in a variety of technical procedures; such as performing tuberculin tests, directing smear-sputum examinations and giving medications. Some take white blood counts and are able to identify bilharzia, malaria and hookworm in laboratory situations.

A Mobile Health Unit or Clinic is another part of the project. This Health Unit was an Independence Gift to the people of Malawi from the people of the United States and was assigned to the Ministry of Health. It is staffed by Peace Corps Volunteers who are technically trained as X-Ray technicians. This unit travels from village to village and town to town so that Malawians may have an opportunity to be X-Rayed and the presence or absence of tuberculosis can be detected.

A Malawian Health Assistant works as an equal partner with each pair of Volunteers. He learns their techniques and professional practices and, in turn, teaches the Volunteers more about village life and health practices. The Health Assistants will be able to continue this aspect of the Ministry's health program after the Peace Corps Volunteers complete their program in Malawi.

ZA UMOYO WA ANTHU:

Upisi Koropusi wa nchito ya Umoyo wa Anthu mu Malawi ili mbali imodzi ya Unduna wa Umoyo. Muli odzipereka makumi anai kufufuzafuza za nthenda ya mtsempho, kuichiritsa ndi kuipewa. Odzipeleka amenewa aikidwa awiri-awiri ndi atatu-atatu pa zipatala za dela line m'malo 17 a dziko lino. Wodzipeleka aliyense ali ndi udindo woyang'anira anthu chikwi chimodzi. Anthu amenewa uku wayang'ana mtsempho ndipo amene apezeka ndi nthendayo akuchiritsidwa m'mabanja ao. Odzipelekawanso amatenga mbiri yofunika ya banja liri lonse, makhalidwe ndi miyambo kuti ziwathandize mndongosolo la kuchiritsa nthendayo. Odzipelekawa aphunzitsidwanso njira zosiyana-siyana, zonga kuyesa anthu odwala, kuyesa makhololo ndi kupeleka mankhwala. Ena atenga magazzi ndi kutha kuwalekanitsa pakati pa nthenda ya likonzo, malungo, ndi chitopo m'malo oyesera maguzi.

Galimoto lacipatala loyesa anthu lija ndi mbali yina ya nchito imeneyi. Galimoto limeneli linali mphatso ya lipendasi kwa anthu a Malawi yochokera kwa anthu a ku Amereka ndipo linapelekedwa ku unduna wa Umoyo. Likuyendetsedwa ndi Mapisi Koropusi odzipeleka amene adziwa bwino a sotenga zithunzi za zifuwa. Galimoto lipita kumudzi ndi ku mdzinda ndi mdzinda kuti Amalawi onse angathe kukhale ndi mwayi wojambulidwa zithunzi kuti kukhala ndi kusakhala kwa mtsemphowo kungathe kudziwika.

CO-OPERATIVES:

Eighteen Peace Corps Volunteers have been assigned to the Ministry of Trade and Industry to assist in the

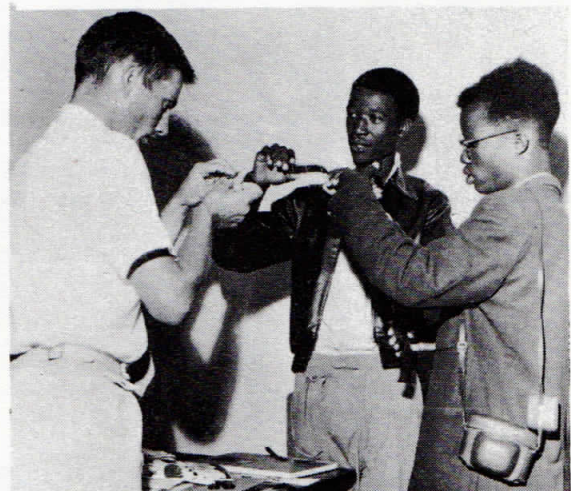


PCV Marilyn Druby teaching news-gathering and interviewing during a special course for Information Assistants.

development of Malawi Co-operatives. The work of these men varies from time to time because of the market seasons. During the market seasons, the Volunteers assist in the business management of the Co-Operatives and stress efficient methods of operating Co-Operatives; they teach better marketing practices such as principles of buying and selling and checking scales for accurate measurements. They also teach bookkeeping and assist farmers in maintaining accurate financial records.

Between marketing seasons, the Volunteers are engaged in agricultural extension programs that involve direct job association with local farmers. These programs permit the Volunteers to teach improved farming methods, soil and water conservation crop rotation and other agricultural techniques.

Like other Peace Corps Volunteers, the men in this project work as an equal partner with Malawian Co-Op assistants who learn their techniques and practices.



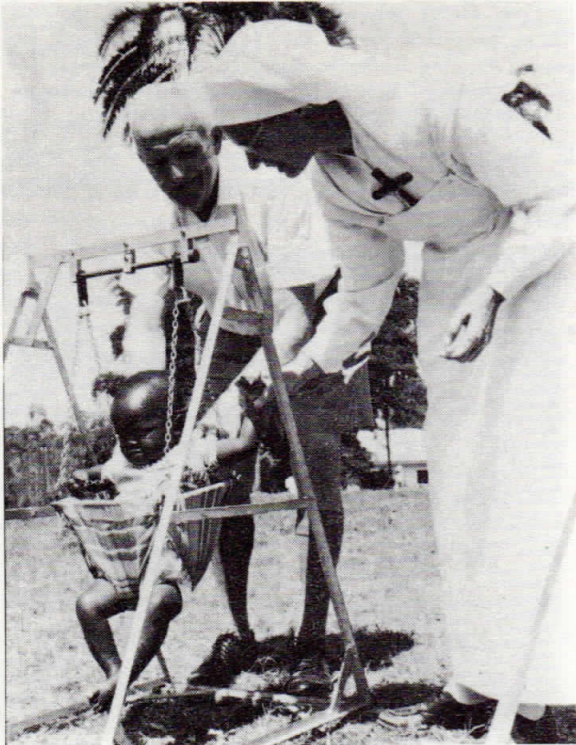

NCHITO ZOGWIRIZANA PA MALONDA

Mapisi koropusi odzipereka khumi ndi asanu ndi atatu aikidwa ku unduna wa malonda ndi nchito kuthandiza kukweza miginirizano ya malonda mu Malawi. Nchito ya anthu amenewa imasintha nthawi ndi nthawi cifukwa ca nthawi ya misika, odzipelekawa amathandiza kulongosola migwirizano ya nchito ya malonda ndi kulimbikitza njira zoyenera kuyendetsara migwirizanoyi, aphunzitsa zo citacita zabwino za misika monga zasikuru zace za kugula ndi kugulitsa malonda ndi kayang'anidwe kasamalitsa ka milingo ya malonda. Anaphunzitsanso kasungudwe kabwino ka mabukhu ndi kuthandiza alimi kasungidwe kabwino ka cuma.

VACATION PROGRAMS:

Peace Corps Volunteers are given 45 days of vacation over a two year tour of service. During this time, they are encouraged to travel in Malawi and in nearby countries for the purpose of increasing their knowledge about Africa and its people.

During other free periods, the Volunteers are expected to engage in vacation programs that will make a contribution toward the development of Malawi and, at the same time, stimulate self-help activity among the people of Malawi. Through such projects

the Peace Corps hopes that Malawians and Americans can learn about each other's way of life.

The Volunteers in Malawi have engaged in such projects as the following.

1. A Malaria eradication program.
2. Inoculated villagers against smallpox.
3. Latrine digging programs as self-help scheme.
4. Constructed recreation fields and facilities, including basketball courts, soccer fields and football fields.
5. Organised Community Clean-up Campaigns.
6. Constructed wells.
7. Conducted Shoe Repair schools and trained Malawians how to repair shoes.
8. Conducted Day Camps for Village children.

9. Built and organised School Libraries.
10. Constructed hospital facilities.
11. Conducted field excursions for students.
12. Conducted courses in News Gathering and News Photography.

The Peace Corps staff and Volunteers in Malawi believe that these programs can assist Malawi toward achieving her own development objectives. We feel that such programs and others that the Government has requested can stimulate the development of self-help schemes which can play a vital part in Malawi's efforts to take her place among the progressive and developing nations of the world.

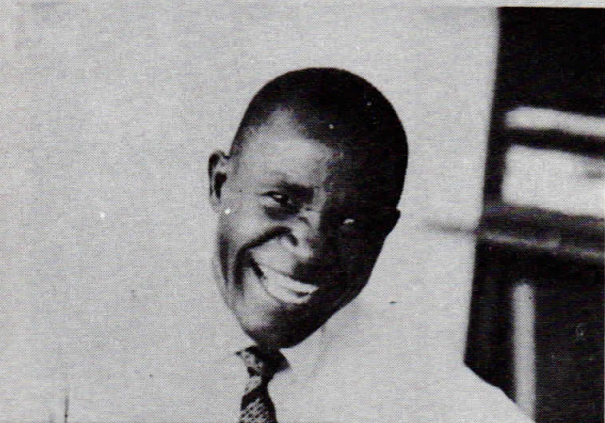
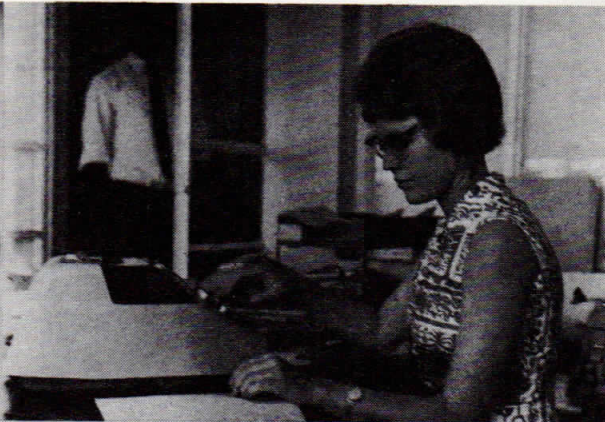
